# Transition - Moving to Adult Hearing Services - North East Lincolnshire January 2024

#### Introduction

# Support from the Educational Team for Hearing and Vision (ETHV)

Once a young person leaves school and goes on to college, training or work, our team will no longer be involved. Colleges have their own team of support staff who should be able to help you. With your permission, we will make contact with your destination college to support with your transition. When you move to college or university, you may want to make yourself known to the Learning Support Team particularly if you are finding it hard to access lessons because of your hearing loss.

#### Hearing aid care and management for young people and adults

When young people leave school and move on to college, training or work placements, audiological care changes too.

The Audiology Department will usually call you back for your first appointment after turning 16 to check your hearing levels, your hearing aids and to see how you are getting on in your new setting. After that you will usually make your own appointments using the contact details below. The staff at the Audiology Department will advise you as to how often you will need to visit in the future. Staff from our team will not be at this clinic as we will no longer be involved.

You can ask to be seen at the Diana Princess of Wales Hospital, Beacon Medical Centre, Weelsby Health Centre, Freshney Green Medical Centre or Pilgrim Health Centre, Immingham. You must ring or email the Audiology Department to arrange an appointment for any of the clinics. Audiology is open from 8.30am to 5.00 pm, Monday to Friday.

You will also need to take your brown battery book or card. Batteries can be posted if requested. If you have earache or a problem with your ears, you must contact your own doctor, not the Audiology Department.

# Assistive listening devices

As you become more independent, you may find that technology designed for use by people with no hearing loss is not ideal for you. You may want to consider using equipment designed specifically for people with a hearing loss. Equipment available could include alarm clocks, smoke alarms, door chimes, baby alarm monitors, telephones and direct audio input leads instead of headphones, radio aids etc. You can get information on these and many other products and general advice from various companies. Links to two such companies are below and there may be others online. The Audiologist at the hospital may also be able to advise you about specialist equipment.
